Chairwoman Walter asked the guests to take a moment to introduce themselves to the committee and offered them an opportunity to share what they were looking forward to for the year. In order of introduction:

Steve Peterson, Director of Emergency Communications, stated he was excited about the build out of the Public Safety Radio System for emergency services for the County. He thanked the Legislature for passing the Resolution funding the Capital Project this past December.

Sheriff Figueroa advised the members that all aspects of Law Enforcement are in an adjustment period following the recent changes at the state level relating to bail and discovery reforms.

Nancy Schmidt, Probation Director, advised the members that it's important to know that the department is more than probation services. She informed them that the department is responsible for the Crime Victims Assistance Program, STOP DWI, Community Service, pre-trial release services, and the Restorative Justice Center.

Mario Tagliaferro, Ulster County Sheriff Office – road side, and PBA President, stated that he was looking forward to continuing to build relationships with community leaders and enhance communications.

Eric Benjamin, Under Sheriff, congratulated the members on their elections and reelections and stated that working with the Legislature, in particular the Law Enforcement Committee, has resulted in great relationships. He extended an invitation to the members to visit the Law Enforcement facility or ride along with an officer.

District Attorney Clegg, said he and his staff are working very hard to bring the office into line with 21st Century bail and discovery laws. He added that there is a Resolution before the committee regarding the Intimate Partner Violence Initiative which he has an update on. He added that he is looking forward to working with the Legislature to make Ulster County just, safe and fair for residents.

Chairwoman Walter invited the Executive's staff to offer comments. Deputy County Executive Rider responded that he was in attendance to speak to the couple of Public Works projects before the committee. He added that he was looking forward to building out the relations between the Executive's Office and the committee, commenting that this committee has been productive and collaborative.

Tom Kadgen, League of Women Voters, said he is concerned with addressing substance abuse, especially marijuana use by youth in the county.

Resolution No. 32: Authorizing The Chair Of The Ulster County Legislature To Execute An Agreement With The New York State Division Of Criminal Justice Services – Project GIVE – Ulster County Sheriff

Resolution Summary: This resolution authorizes the Chair of the Legislature to execute an agreement in the amount of \$25,250 with the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the purpose of participating in a twelve-month joint county crime reduction program for the period beginning July 1, 2019 and ending June 30, 2020.

Discussion:

District Attorney Clegg stated that GIVE was a really good program which funds a portion of one of his ADA's salaries. Chairwoman Walter explained that the state awards GIVE grants to the District Attorney's Office, the Department of Probation and the Sheriff's Office. She added that this Resolution is specific to the Sheriff's Office, with the Resolutions pertaining the to the DA and Probation approved in November 20109. Sheriff Figueroa explained that the funding is used to offset the cost of one of his investigators.

Chairwoman Walter advised Sheriff Figueroa and others in attendance that she would be asking for data to be shared with her and the committee on deliverables for many of the grants received and programs funded, such as number of individuals reached, services provided, etc. She added that she would not be asking for information that is not already required to be tracked by the awarding agency.

Legislator Heppner asked if the county also receives SNUG funding. Legislator Haynes added that SNUG funding traditionally accompanies GIVE funding. Director Schmidt responded that GIVE is an evidence based program that comes out of DCJS. She added that there are several different techniques offered with each local jurisdiction selecting the one that works best for them. She explained that for the past several years the county has been focusing on domestic violence which is a specific population identified under GIVE. Chairwoman Walter asked for an explanation of how funding is being used to address domestic violence. Director Schmidt responded that Probation uses their GIVE grant to fund two staff members that have specialized caseloads to respond to incidents of DV involving guns and knives. The members briefly discussed an officer's ability to readily obtain information on whether there are weapons in a home where they are responding to a DV call. Sheriff Figueroa stated that an officer can call to know if there is a registered firearm in the house. Director Peterson stated that 911 dispatchers ask if there are weapons in the house when fielding calls, and relay that information to responding officers. Chairwoman Walter expressed her desire to discuss the topic in greater detail at a future meeting.

Chairwoman Walter recognized District Attorney Clegg to discuss the grant. Mr. Clegg stated that he spoke to DCJS earlier in the day who informed him that the county has been paid through 2017, with 2018 funding still outstanding. He added that the federal government has issued a new directive indicating that states would not qualify for funding unless they are fully compliant with all federal immigration enforcement tactics. He advised the members that he was in receipt of a letter from DCJS that funding would be eliminated as of February 2020 because of certain state policies related to undocumented individuals. He encouraged the members to approve the Resolution as there may be other funding sources available to fill the gaps. He explained that the grant funds an Intimate Partner Violence Intervention Program which works to identify individuals who may have violent tendencies and provides intervention before instances of domestic violence are escalated. He added that the program has been in place for two years and offers counseling and other resources using a restorative justice approach to stop domestic violence.

Chairwoman Walter advised the members that she was very familiar with the program. She informed stated that the program recognizes that intimate partner violence can occur at three levels, very low or early, moderate, and extreme, and recognizes that the response to both the victim and offender needs to vary accordingly. She explained that the program was tested for efficacy in Pennsylvania, but should be further tested. She added that Byrne JAG is funding that only a state can apply for and expressed her hope that the county will pursue other funding sources to continue intimate partner violence prevention initiatives.

Legislator Haynes asked for clarification on the dates contained in the Resolution, questioning if the county has missed a filing deadline. Mr. Clegg advised the members that the 2020 funding has not arrived yet, and the county was in the process of getting reimbursed for 2018 and 2019. Deputy County Executive Rider added that there have been other funding streams similarly effected due to changes in federal requirements. Sheriff Figueroa advised the members that he was notified of elimination of SCARP funding in 2019 because of similar federal compliance issues. He advised the members that the decision was ultimately reversed.

District Attorney Clegg advised the members that his office has two employees funded by the program and encouraged the Legislature to continue funding the program despite the elimination of the grant.

Chairwoman Walter stated that the mission and goals of the One80 program is the crux of the restorative justice process and commented that an understanding of the reach of program, including knowing the

community organizations, law enforcement agencies and school district partners, is key to promoting and growing an effective restorative justice model.

Director Schmidt stated that One80 is a wonderful program, adding that Family of Woodstock provides a ton of data that she would be happy to share with the members.

She stated that she was excited about the group and that there is a lot to dig into. She added that she believes reforms to the criminal justice system are long overdue and looks forward to working with such and informed and experienced group of professionals.

Chairwoman Walter moved on to New Business on the agenda and polled the members for their interest in adding a tour to a regular meeting or scheduling a separate tour. Sheriff Figueroa asked if the tour could be coordinated with all members of the Legislature. The members briefly discussed possible dates for tours and meetings.

Chairwoman Walter asked the members to share if there is something of particular interest to them or an issue they feel the committee should look into.

Legislator Fabiano stated that the county has gotten off to a good start with the heroin and opioid addiction problem and would like to see the focus of law enforcement and the District Attorney's Office remain on treatment and assistance as opposed to punishment.

Legislator Haynes emphasized the importance of continuing to support law enforcement and the DA's Office and providing them with the resources they need to keep communities safe. She added that she is very interested in the effectiveness of MATs in the jail and follow-up treatment after discharge. Sheriff Figueroa advised the members that the MAT program was implemented on January 15 and said he would keep the committee updated. The members briefly discussed post-release follow up plans, including transitional living, detox facilities, social services, etc.

Legislator Heppner advised the members that what he has enjoyed the most about the committee is the open dialogue and honest conversations the members of the committee as well as the reporting departments. He expressed his hope for a continuation of that openness.

Legislator Parete said that he is also concerned with the opioid crisis, adding that he believes there needs to be more resources put into prevention, particularly in schools and community organizations that serve children. He added that the state and county have done a good job raising awareness, but more needs to be done. Sheriff Figueroa agreed that there are still obstacles to getting into schools, adding that his office has been utilizing a trailer to educate parents and others of the possible signs and indicators of substance use. Deputy Executive Rider stated that the county and state have also been reaching out to prescribers to reduce the frequency, quantity and dosage of opioid based medications that they prescribe. Chairwoman Walter advised the members that there is a county opioid strategic task force which she and many of the people in the room sit on, whose mission is to pull together the different organizations working on the issue to provide coordination and sharing of resources. She added that one of the working groups will be focusing on prevention. She informed the members that there was a very successful HIV prevention program in schools many years ago which could be repurposed.

Chairwoman Walter stated that she is personally interested in discussing the county's community corrections program, use of vacant space in the jail, centralized arraignment and the county's restorative justice programs.

Chairwoman Walter thanked the members and all those in attendance for their time and asked if there was any other business, and hearing none;
