Resolution No. 52: Authorizing The Acquisition Of Right-Of-Way Interests Over Certain Real Property For The Hudson Valley Rail Trail West: Phase 4 (PIN 8761.21) In The Town Of Lloyd

And Amending Capital Project No. 451 For Right-Of-Way Acquisition – Department Of Planning

Resolution Summary: This resolution authorizes an additional \$36,715.00 for Capital Project No. 451 for the purpose of right-of-way acquisitions previously estimated and authorized for \$84,835.00.

Resolution Summary: This resolution establishes Capital Project No. 480 to replace the SUNY Ulster Kingston Center lower level roof located at 94 Mary's Avenue. This resolution covers both design services and construction - 50% reimbursable from the NYS Dormitory Authority. Standard rubberized roof replacement required due to leakage. \$130K – A bond resolution will be required.

Resolution No. 56: Amending Capital Project No. 261 – Tongore Bridge Replacement (PIN 8757.13) – Funding Right-Of-Way Acquisition And Incidentals Phase And Authorizing The Chairman Of The Ulster County Legislature To Execute Agreements, Certifications Or Reimbursement Requests For Federal Aid On Behalf Of Ulster County With The New York State Department Of Transportation – Amending The 2017 Capital Fund Budget – Public Works (Highways And Bridges)

Resolution Summary: Capital Project No. 261 was established pursuant to Resolution No. 298 back in 1999 to provide authorization and funding for preliminary engineering and right-of-way incidental work for the project, however was delayed primarily due to right-of-way issues which required a complete redesign of the bridge as well as limited engineering resources due to a shift in priorities after Hurricane Irene. The delay created an inability to meet milestone requirements causing the project to be dropped from the plan. Since then the request for an extension was approved. A bond resolution will be required.

The replacement of the culvert will increase the flow by almost 4 times, however in the event where the Wallkill rises and submerges the outlet of the culvert this larger structure will do little to alleviate flooding in the vicinity. 100% County \$120K, a bond resolution will be required.

Resolution Summary: This resolution establishes Capital Project No. 498 – for the construction of various road shoulder work to be contracted with an outside contractor. Work will be based on identified public need and governing field conditions - yearly construction of asphalt shoulders to help improve public safety. 100% County \$250K, a bond resolution will be required.

Resolution Summary: This resolution establishes Capital Project No. 499 – for the purchase of \$870K of county fleet acquisitions approved in the 2017 – 2022 Capital Program. This capital project replaces existing vehicles due to extensive rust and corrosion that are deemed no longer cost effective for repair. 100% County \$870K, a bond resolution will be required.

Discussion: This project resolution allows for the purchase of 20 vehicles; five for the Sheriff's Criminal Division, one for the Public Defender, one for Environment, one for the County Clerk, one for 911, two for the Health Department, four for DSS, one for Arson Task Force, three for Veterans Administration, and one for Planning. The committee confirmed green energy – electric vehicles are included part of the fleet acquisition. Legislator Greene expressed it was her understanding the county is ahead of schedule implementing green energy vehicles. Legislator Loughran noted coming off the NYSAC conference there's a huge push for electric vehicles and installation of charging stations. Legislator Litts questioned the five year plan noting in 2020 & 2021 the county is projecting the purchase of Ford Fusions and not Ford Fusion Energy vehicles. Sue Plonski will follow up with Amanda LaValle when she returns from maternity leave. Committee discussion ensued as to charging station compatibility and installations at grocery stores.

Resolution Summary: This resolution establishes Capital Project No. 500 – for the purchase of \$3,120,000.00 of county Highway Equipment approved in the 2017 – 2022 Capital Program. 100% County, a bond resolution will be required.

<u>Discussion</u>: This project resolution allows for the purchase of 23 pieces of equipment for the Department of Public Works (Roads and Bridges.) Three Catepillar 930K Loader w/boom, 3.3yd bucket & forks, three International Single Axle Snow Plow 4x4, one Trailer for hydromulcher, four Chevy 3500, 4x4 Crew Cab Dump Truck, four International Tandem Snow Plow w/ prewet tanks, two International Tri Axle Dump Truck, one International fuel truck, four Trailers and one New Holland tractor mowers, boom and arm. Chairman Fabiano noted in his experience there are product limitations /offerings available to counties when using the NYS bid list. Each township has different needs.

Sue Plonski emailed the committee the next day stating all purchases of equipment for 2017 are off of the NYS bid, NJPA (National Joint Powers Alliance) pricing, and or piggy-backed off of another County's bid, whichever provides the lowest available pricing. All items are needed to replace old and/or worn out equipment that will be auctioned off once the new equipment is received.
